Girl Scouts of San Gorgonio Council (GSSGC), builds girls of courage, confidence, and character who make the world a better place. Our programs empower girls, especially from under-resourced communities, by providing them with the skills, opportunities, and support they need to become leaders in Riverside and San Bernardino counties.

With a strong focus on closing educational gaps and providing girls with the tools to succeed, GSSGC works to ensure that girls from all backgrounds have equal access to leadership and growth opportunities.

Our organization has made strides in being intentional with our process and hiring practices to ensure we are a reflection of our community, helping to increase access and education for all. A survery of GSSGC members found that 94 percent of Girl Scouts agree that they celebrate and learn about the diverse customs, values, and traditions of different races and cultures, reflecting GSSGC's commitment to diversity.

The **Girl Scout Gold Award** is the highest honor a Girl Scout can earn, and once achieved, it demonstrates to colleges, employers, and the community that a girl is making a real difference in the world. This prestigious award, available to high school girls, empowers them to address important issues in their communities while developing key skills in areas such as critical thinking, community development, and project management. Girls average eighty hours of work to complete their projects, and through the process, become well-rounded leaders, ready to provide exemplary community service. Projects range from creating a community garden for low-income seniors to provide necessary healthy food options, to providing sustainable art therapy for children.

Medal of Honor

The Medal of Honor is GSUSA's national lifesaving award established in 1913 to honor Girl Scouts who show exceptional courage and leadership in lifesaving situations. It recognizes those who independently initiate or lead rescue efforts, often under conditions where most their age couldn't act, whether or not they risk their own lives.

Lilah Razo

On October 27, 2023, Lilah Razo demonstrated remarkable courage and composure when her aunt Maggie, who has developmental disabilities and early onset Alzheimer's, began choking and had trouble breathing. While her parents tried to clear Maggie's airway, Lilah quickly called 911 and calmly assisted throughout the emergency. As Maggie became increasingly combative, Lilah helped keep everyone safe, followed dispatcher instructions precisely, and took initiative to prepare for the arrival of paramedics. Her maturity and fearlessness stood out as she remained focused and proactive during the entire crisis. Thanks to Lilah's quick thinking and selfless actions, her aunt Maggie survived the incident. Lilah's bravery and leadership in a critical moment reflect the highest ideals of the Girl Scoutscourage, compassion, and resourcefulness.





Zoë Minter


Central West • Troop 75

On May 2, 2023, 17-year-old Zoë Minter responded to a call for help while at a theater when a man appeared to suffer cardiac arrest. Acting quickly, Zoë and two others put their emergency first aid skills to the test and laid the man flat, checked his airway, and began CPR while someone called 911. For 15-to-20 minutes, they took turns administering CPR until paramedics arrived. Zoë, the paramedics, and the other good Samaritans helped move the man onto a stretcher. Later, Zoë went above and beyond when she checked on his condition at the hospital. What was truly remarkable about Zoë's actions was not just her quick thinking and calm demeanor, but also her CPR proficiency. She displayed a level of skill and composure that one would not expect from a person her age.

Classroom to Career

In Classroom to Career, girls engage in job shadowing, career workshops, and industry panels to explore diverse career fields and develop essential skills like teamwork, communication, and problem-solving. In a post-program survey, girls overwhelmingly said that the Classroom to Career program left them optimistic about their futures.

Allied Health Day: Girls explored careers in Healthcare, learning about Radiologic Technology, Respiratory Care (including CPR), Fire Technology, and Emergency Medical Services.

Caltrans Transportation Day: Activities included handling drones, testing construction materials, conducting environmental surveys, and touring the Caltrans facility.
